On October 12, Greg Lee, co-founder of the Two Frogs Healing Center in Frederick, spoke to our members about Lyme disease. His discussion included who was most at risk for getting the disease, its symptoms and how herbs, acupuncture and detoxification can help to resolve recurring Lyme disease pain, mental fog and fatigue. 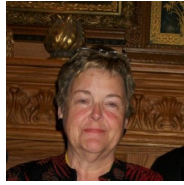
WOW!

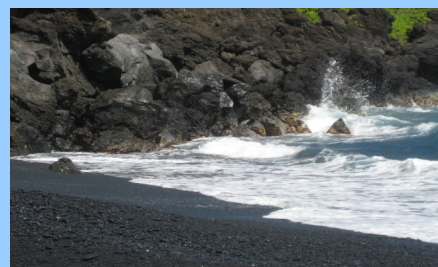


Hello fellow Rotarians

We visited the small, quaint village of Lahaina and enjoyed gazing at one of the most famous Banyan Trees – a single tree that encompasses an entire city block. We toured the “Road to Hana” which is a wide, single lane road through rainforests and hosts a number of beautiful waterfalls AND over 600 hairpin turns. There were lots of stops along the way including the famous Puukekaa (or Black Rock) Kaanapali Beach where we enjoyed a show by the local mongooses! They were really cute. We hiked through a lava tube at the base of the volcano – kind of like spelunking but not quite as exciting. The crème-de-le-crème was the Haleakala Sunrise. We drove up to an elevation of 10,000 feet to watch the sunrise over the clouds. There are only three places in the world to see a sunrise like this. It was breathtaking. I visited a local Rotary Club while there. Maui’s resident population is about 145,000 and they have nine Rotary Clubs with an average membership of about 45. However beautiful it was, I am glad to be home! Aloha!

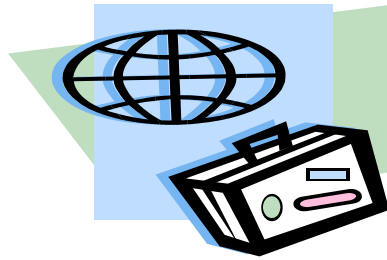
November 25th is Thanksgiving Day! It's a time to give thanks for all that we have.
